One last winter storm in March and spring now brings on all the gardening chores, removing all the downed tree branches (this year has seemed to be particularly windy), pruning, and planting has kept me busy.

With this issue we get to continue our Z-100's $40^{\rm th}$ birthday challenge with phase three, our LifeLine Crossword Puzzle. I hope you have been working on phases one (The LifeLine Trivia Quiz) and phase two (The LifeLine Word Find Puzzle), because the end of the contest is coming fast. While I was doing some spring cleaning, I was backing up my LifeLine work, and I found a few finished articles that never got published. So, I'll include one here and I'll have to postpone the other two for next time...

This Insert article describes another piece of reasonably priced test equipment for our tool box. Another kit, the **DSO150 Oscilloscope** is a bigger brother to the DSO138 (discussed in an earlier issue), but with a professional looking case included.

It is another inexpensive, low-speed miniature oscilloscope with a 2.4", 262K color LCD display. Based on the ARM Cortex-M3 processor, it was developed by JYE Tech, China. It is sold as a full kit, or a partial kit with all the surface mounted parts already installed on the boards, leaving just a few parts remaining.

Like the earlier DS0138, it was designed as a training oscilloscope. The DS0150 contains only the basic oscilloscope functions with no fancy

features. Simplicity in structure and easiness in assembly and operation are the main highlights of the design.

However, do not sell it short. This unit appears to fit the bill perfectly for a small, inexpensive addition to a mobile electronics tool box.

The article also presents an excellent user's manual, with a full explanation of the various features, specifically created for beginners.

This article had actually been finished and was meant for publishing back in issue #134, but I got sidetracked by the Gotek Floppy Disk Emulator articles and had forgotten about it. I guess better late than never is the phrase of the day.

And speaking of Gotek, as you might recall in my Gotek exploits that I complained that the Rotary Encoder was not acting as it should. Sometimes it would not respond, other times it skipped entries. Well, Charles Hett studied the problem and has found a solution that you may want to know about. Please read his article, "Gotek Rotary Encoder Fix", in this issue.

'Z-100 LifeLine' Website Articles

Over the past several weeks, I have been working hard to find a better, easier means of listing articles on my Website and then updating them. It was amazing how much dated information was contained in these - most had not been updated since they were originally published!

But my first problem was with Joomla! Joomla! would prefer that all articles be placed as separate pages on the Website, which is no easy

task. Its advantages, however, are several:

- I can create links to other articles.
- Pictures can have links to larger versions to give you a better view of details.
- Future changes are easier to do on the fly.
- All the articles have the same look & feel.
- Navigation between articles (or pages) on the website are easy.

But the disadvantages are also numerous:

- Joomla! gives a list of articles (pages) in the order they are created, and when the numbers increase, it is difficult to locate the one I need.
- Each article in Joomla! takes longer to create, with special features and formatting that relies on a special editor.
- Joomla! has updates to load nearly every time that I need to make a change, but worse, it relies on the PHP programming language, which has its own changes that come out periodically, AND the editor that I use is JCE and this editor has changes that occur as often as Joomla!.

All these changes do not give an air of stability. JCE (the editor) has already had a bug in one version that would not let me make changes to the website copy in my computer for two weeks! The next version finally fixed that problem.

So I worry constantly that one of these changes (made by anyone at a whim, it seems) will make the website unusable for some period of time or cause me to loose it entirely. And the backups that I create with every change appear to be very complicated to restore.

Thankfully, I have not needed to look into those procedures yet, but it appears that it would involve the same procedures as creating a new website on a new host. Why does everything need to be so complicated?

So, in the event of a problem, I have to keep a copy of the text for each Joomla! article in a documents folder on my computer anyway. This copy does not include pictures or images. If I lose a Joomla! article, I would have to recreate the article, from scratch. And when I change the article, I also need to remember to save the text file again.

None of this seemed to be very efficient, and I spend more time updating Joomla! than I would like.

Shortly after establishing the Website for the fourth time (because of my learning errors), I found that I COULD display .PDF files very easily. Just place the .PDF article in a folder called articles and create a link to the .PDF file. And the file could contain pictures and save all the formatting.

My early .PDF files were created by simply combining scanned pages of previously published articles together. You could NOT highlight and copy individual paragraphs, and to print these, you had to print the entire document!

My newest .PDF files are created within Word-Perfect, with paragraphs, phrases, or lines that can easily be highlighted and copied and even printed without difficulty. I can even use hyperlinks (once I figure that out)!

This also permitted me to create the article with WordPerfect in my computer, save the file in .PDF format, upload the file to the Website, and NEVER have to worry if it disappears again!

This method does have its disadvantages:

- I can not seem to find a way to link to other articles on the Website that might be relevant.
- I can not create a link to larger versions of pictures to show greater detail.

I'm sure that there must be a way to do either or both of these, but the solutions are presently eluding me.

So, I have spent hours updating articles for the Website, deleting some of the old Joomla! articles, and creating a new page for the Website, 'LifeLine Articles':

This page provides access to many updated "Z-100 LifeLine" articles, broken into several categories. You just click on the link provided to read or print the article.
